Shire's New Brand Identity Unveiled

The Shire of Coolgardie is excited to announce the launch of its new brand identity to the community.

The Shire of Coolgardie's uniqueness and diversity is to be reflected in this identity, rightfully recognising Coolgardie as the 'Mother of the Goldfields'.

Coolgardie is renowned for being the birthplace of the great gold rush of 1892, and Kambalda is recognised as Australia's first nickel town.

A true mining powerhouse, this Shire has contributed to both the state's economy and mining output in a significant way. Generating \$3.4 billion of value in mineral production last financial year, this places the area as the largest mineral producer in the region, and the third largest local government producer in the state after the Pilbara.

Continuing to punch above its weight, there's also

been 8.9 per cent growth in mineral production from 2017/18 – the largest regional growth percentage.

Malcolm Cullen, Shire President, said "I believe these record numbers can be partly attributed to the Shire's proactive approach in engaging with mining companies to support their operations and growth in the area. We are anticipating continual growth in the value of mineral production of at least 4 to 5 per cent in the next two years."

Wednesday November 20 was centred around communicating and sharing this new brand identity to all members of the community - from Shire staff, to elected members, students from Coolgardie Primary School, Kambalda Primary School and Kambalda West District High School as well as parents and school staff.

"The Shire of Coolgardie has been progressing a number of exciting projects in recent weeks including the development of the Kambalda Aquatic Facility, the re-opening of Coolgardie Pool, and various health and wellness initiatives such as the Memorandums of Understanding (MOU's) signed with Goldfields Individual Family Support Association and Addlife Physiotherapy, which complement our partnership in delivering Primary Health Services into Kambalda with St John Medical," Mr Cullen said.

"It's an important time to consider the Shire's identity and how these new projects are shaping our community.

"The Shire's current crest logo was designed and has been in use since the early 1970s. With so much renewed activity in the region, it is an exciting time for the Shire and our community and Council felt this was an opportune time to freshen up and promote the face of the Shire of Coolgardie.

Message from the Shire President - December 2019

During the past six weeks in the Shire, Councillors and staff have been engaged in a series of workshops and training exercises with regards to updating and reviewing plans and procedures that guide both staff and the Council with the aim of gaining optimum output and efficiencies throughout the organisation.

The Asset Management workshop, being one of these, has resulted in a strategy to formulate the Shire Asset Management Plan and have this implemented over the following 12 months. This modern and updated system will enable staff to gain better understanding of asset renewal and the amount of funding required in future years to maintain and/or replace Shire asset. These include buildings, plant and equipment, vehicles, roads and footpaths.

Also, during the first week of November, the second phase of Service Level Review workshops were held with our consultant John Ravlic over three days in Kambalda. Since the initial inception of the Level of Service, the efficiencies within the Shire have seen steady improvement and with ongoing training and mentoring of staff the benefits to the community will continue to improve in the future.

Our CEO, James Trail, has developed a new organisational structure which will see a Director of Operation Services, Director of Economic and Community Development and Manager Commercial Services under and responsible to the CEO. The new Director of Operations Services will commence on December 2, 2019 and will bring more than 12 years of strategic experience to the Shire, whilst the Director Economic and Community Development and Manager Commercial Services positions will be filled by current members of staff.

At the Special Meeting of Council on November 12, 2019, Council endorsed a recommendation to commit additional funding to the Kambalda Pool restoration project. This funding will enable further work to be carried out to include shade structures and solar heating for the learn to swim and leisure pool, and some landscaping to the pool surrounds.

Whilst acknowledging the extra work may delay the opening of the pool, Council felt these works would enhance the project overall and would reduce the necessity to rework parts of the project next year. Once this work is completed, Council is confident that this facility will be a state-of-the-art recreation centre and benefit the community for many years into the future.

For some months now Council has been working with the Market Creations Group to develop a new logo and branding for the Shire of Coolgardie. In discussion with Councillors and staff, it was felt there was a need to update and refresh the Shire image in line with the strategic direction and improving economy in the region, and working with Market Creations we believe the new brand will enhance the image and promote the Shire as a proactive and engaging organisation.

The brand and logo was launched at both Coolgardie and Kambalda West schools on Thursday, November 20, 2019, then on the following day at the Kalgoorlie-Boulder Chamber of Commerce and Industry, What's Down the Track Forum and Exhibition. Overall the new logo has been received in a very favourable manner to date ,with many positive comments on the Shire face book site.



Coolgardie Looks To The Future At What's Down the Track Forum

On November 21, the 20th annual Kalgoorlie-Boulder Chamber of Commerce and Industry What's Down The Track Forum & Exhibition was held. As the event's Platinum sponsor, the Shire of Coolgardie presented a keynote address during the forum and hosted a booth within the exhibition display.

Chief Executive Officer, James Trail's keynote address formally launched the Shire's new brand identity to industry representatives.

"The new brand identity for the Shire of Coolgardie highlights the strength and diversification of our region's economic base and marks an exciting time for our community," said Malcolm Cullen, Shire President.

"After sharing this 'new look' with the community yesterday, we're excited by the opportunity to present our new brand to our partners in industry at the What's Down The Track conference."

"The Shire is privileged to have had the opportunity to sponsor an event that showcases the strength of the mining industry in the Goldfields. Over the past two years, the Shire has proactively engaged with mining companies, health service providers and other local organisations to promote economic development and deliver better services and benefits to our community."

Chief Executive Officer James Trail also announced a new organisational structure for the Shire within his keynote address. Endorsed at a Special Meeting on 12 November 2019, the new structure consists of:

- Director of Operation Services
- Director of Economic and Community
 Development
- Manager Commercial Services

The new Director of Operation Services will commence with the Shire on the 2nd December 2019 and brings in excess of 12 years' strategic experience as a Chief Executive Officer. The



Director of Economic and Community Development and Manager Commercial Services will be filled by current members of staff.


This restructure stems from an organisational review undertaken by the Shire which included interviews and workshops with staff members to create an unbiased reallocation of duties based on functionality and efficiency.

The review recommended that, for the Shire to progress, grow and continue to meet the needs and expectations of its community, the CEO and his management team must operate at a strategic level. The new structure has not meant any redundancies but rather a renewed focus on strategy and operational efficiencies.

Changes will reflect a Shire that, over the last four years have become more responsive, agile and better able to deliver on Council's commitments to the community. The changes also reflect Council's focus for a greater emphasis on community engagement, planning, development and improved customer service.

"The Councillors have been extremely well-briefed during the review process and in the development of this new structure," said Malcolm Cullen, Shire President.

"I am confident that we have a skilled team with the right people in place to deliver the best outcomes for the community and our stakeholders."




Making the crafts to go with those books has been exciting week after week, and introduces new skills and techniques, helping young children develop fine motor skills.

Shire Prioritises Population Growth And Skills Supply



The Shire of Coolgardie is the largest producer of minerals in the region, with gold and nickel mining operations supporting globally significant regional exports.

With the rapid increase in mineral production, skills shortages throughout the region, and decline of the Shire's population (10.8% in five years), the Shire is committed to implementing attraction and retention strategies to its towns.

On November 27, the Shire formally signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Goldfields Community Legal Centre Inc. - a notfor-profit organisation that was successful in obtaining State Government Regional Economic Development (RED) Grants to deliver the Goldfields Migration Employment Project.

The project aims to alleviate the labour and skills shortage in the Goldfields region by engaging with migrant communities based in metropolitan areas of WA and assisting employment seekers with access to Goldfields-based job opportunities and ancillary settlement support services.

By signing the MOU, both the Shire and GCLC hope to work collaboratively to develop a migration strategy to attract people to the Shire. This includes promoting to metropolitan migrant communities, job opportunities and regional living benefits.

"The Shire is a partner in the Goldfields Designated Area Migration Agreement with a number of neighbouring local governments. A target was set to encourage businesses to sponsor 500 migrants each year to to the region. Four months into the agreement, this is proving to be an extremely ambitious goal," said Malcolm Cullen, Shire President.

"GCLC have an in-depth understanding on liveability factors that attract migrants to the region, and we intend to work closely with the GCLC to facilitate relationships and job opportunities. With median housing prices in Kambalda reported at \$100,000 and rentals ranging from \$150 to \$200 per week

for three-bedroom homes, housing afforuability, combined with plentiful job opportunities provide a real opportunity to attract locally based workforces.

"We are excited to become the first local government in the Goldfields region to develop this partnership with the GCLC and encourage other local governments in the region to establish similar partnerships."

The Shire of Coolgardie will develop marketing and promotional materials to highlight all that the area has to offer to new residents before Christmas.

Indue Card Shopfronts Ready To Help

The Cashless Debit Card shopfronts in both Coolgardie and Kambalda are still operating, and participants with any questions or concerns are encouraged to visit their local shopfront for assistance.

The Cashless Debit Card (or Indue Card) shopfront is still up and running at both the Coolgardie Community Recreation Centre and Kambalda Community Recreation Facility.

The team would like to remind participants that the Indue Card is very similar to a normal EFTPOS card and can be used at any store with an EFTPOS terminal, with the exception of stores that exclusively sell alcohol and/or gambling products (such as BWS, Liquorland, TAB etc.), or for withdrawing cash.



Some uses of the Indue card include:

- Paying your rent/mortgage with BPAY, direct debit, BSB and account number, using the card numbers or at your real estate's EFTPOS terminal. If you pay rent through Centrepay or Rent Deduction Scheme, no changes are needed.
- Pay bills with BPAY, using the card numbers, direct debit, in person at the post office or at your real estate's EFTPOS terminal.
- Pay car registration with BPAY, card numbers, at the post office or at the Department of Transport.
- Paying for insurances with BPAY, direct debit, card numbers or at the post office.
- Buying food and groceries from Coles, Woolworths, IGA, take-aways, restaurants and more.
- Purchasing a car from a dealership using the card numbers, direct debit or EFTPOS terminal.
- Paying for fuel.
- Shopping for clothes, electricals, furniture and more at stores such as Kmart, Target, Harvey Norman, Telstra etc.

 Online shopping using the card number, name, expiry date and CCV. Please check the Indue website for approved places you can shop online.

Please ensure that you have your bill letter with the barcode if you are wanting to pay bills at the post office.

If none of the above options of payment are acceptable for you, direct debits using an external account can be set up through the helpful team at the shopfront or over the phone with the Cashless Debit Card Hotline: 1800 252 604. Evidence will need to be provided (such as a regular payment for private rent, shown on a bank statement).

If you require any help with setting up payments or have questions about your Cashless Debit Card, please see the staff at the shopfronts.

Treats, sweets and leftovers

Holiday time means we all tend to over indulge - and our pets also tend to get a little more spoilt than normal. With this in mind please make sure you are keeping an eye on your pet's diet and what they are eating as there are a lot of foods around the Christmas table that may cause them harm. Foods that may be harmful to pets: chocolate, nuts, onion, garlic, chives, cinnamon, avocado, fruit pits, alcohol and coffee.

Weather conditions

Please keep fresh water and adequate shelter available and readily accessible for your pets over the holiday period as it is our hottest time of the year. Also keep in mind when exercising and walking your pets, that the bitumen and footpaths can get very hot and can potentially burn your pets' paws.



Common foods toxic to dogs

Along with the hot weather we tend to get a lot of summer storms that can cause a lot of damage so make sure you have any loose items in your yard tied down and secured. If you can, you should bring your pets inside or at least have somewhere safe for them to seek shelter during severe weather conditions.

Finally, don't forget, it is bushfire season so please make sure you have a plan in place for your pets as well as yourself, just in case you are required to evacuate and leave suddenly.

Fact Sheet - Canine Parvirus Infection

What is Parvovirus?

Canine parvovirus (parvo) is a highly contagious infection that affects all dogs of any age. The virus is very aggressive and has an extremely high mortality rate if left untreated. Parvo attacks the lining of the dog's stomach and also the bone marrow which produces white blood cells. Dogs who have recovered from parvovirus should not be walked in public for several weeks.

How can my dog become infected with parvo?

The parvovirus is transmitted either by direct contact with an infected dog, or indirectly through faecal matter from an infected dog. Due to the stability of the virus it is easily transmitted via the hair or feet of



infected dogs, contaminated shoes, clothes, and other objects. This means that even if your dog never goes to the park or mixes with other dogs, it can be exposed to virus in its own environment. Parvovirus is highly resistant to the effects of heat, detergents and alcohol so it can remain in the environment for up to a year after an infected dog has been there.

What are the symptoms of parvo?

Dogs will usually become ill or show signs of illness 7-10 days after being infected with parvo. Not all dogs will show every sign of parvo. If your dog shows any sign of illness you should contact the vet as soon as possible.

Symptoms of parvo can include:

- Vomiting
- Diarrhea, including bloody diarrhea
- Loss of appetite
- Lethargy and depression

How do I protect my dog against parvo?

Parvo is an easily preventable disease through vaccination. Contact your local vet to check your dog is up to date with its vaccinations or to schedule a vaccination.

Can my dog pass parvo onto my family or other animals?

There is currently no evidence that Canine Parvovirus can be caught by humans.

Like all rushes, they die down. Kambalda wasn't the exception

The discovery of the Golden Eagle at Larkinville in 1930 triggered a new exciting chapter in the Goldfields.

George Cowcill was working on his father's farm in Quairading, when he, along with two friends decided to head to Larkinville themselves. Obviously, they weren't the only ones, as upon their arrival the area was crowded with prospectors.

George and his friends moved on to Kambalda. He began prospecting and recovered some gold at the surface, but after six months he ended up having to borrow money for fuel to get back to Quairading. He was hooked, and after shearing sheep to save money, he went back to Kambalda in 1932. He followed a small lead, but it was not enough to keep him financial, so, instead of returning to his farm, he got a job with the Lake View and Star Company in Kalgoorlie.

He worked at various mines from 1932 to 1949 and spent most of weekends prospecting – which was a common hobby among other miners.

In 1949, he returned to his farm. But by 1954, he left

again. This time he took his eldest son with him, and spurred on by the first uranium boom. After calling in to the Coolgardie Mining Registrar's office to look at samples of uranium-bearing rock, he was reminded of the rocks he had taken from the pits he dug in 1939. So, once again he headed back to Kambalda. On October 4, 1954, he took samples into the School of Mines in Kalgoorlie to be tested for radioactive minerals. The tests came back negative, but a senior lecturer in geology at the school by the name of Bill Cleverly assayed them for copper and nickel.

The test showed that the samples contained traces of nickel, even telling Cowcill, "in view of the meagre Australian resources of nickel and the relativity high price, it might be worthwhile to explore the extent of the occurrence and to submit representative samples for nickel assay".

Of course, he returned to collect more samples which Cleverly tested. He told Cowcill the percentage of the nickel would be almost insignificant and certainly not an economic proposition. Yet, the fact that Cleverly reported the presence of nickel in the samples was important as Cowcill would have otherwise probably discarded and forgotten them.

The Western Mining Corporation (WMC) had gold mining interests in Kalgoorlie and Norseman, and in the late 1950s they decided to expand its exploration. Cowcill had told a longtime associate, John Morgan, about his nickel find and checked the samples, confirming the presence of nickel.

These samples were then taken to WMC's assistant chief geologist, Mr. Roy Woodall, in Kalgoorlie, who recognised the significance of the results from the samples.

Morgan and Woodall visited the area in Kambalda in September of 1964, where they recognised the potential, and as such reported this to the General Superintendent of WMC, Laurence C. Brodie-Hall in a letter dated 23 September 1964: "I am not suggesting I have found an orebody, but the occurrence is of great significance."

Brodie-Hall's involvement at WMC board meetings, and active support and enthusiasm played a major role in the success of the project.

Mapping of the area was conducted under the

supervision of WMC geologist Guy Travis. His mapping was very thorough and of a high quality.

Cowcill was back working on his farm during this time but made the odd trip to the Goldfields to check on progress. During one of these trips he struck a deal with Morgan over a beer in Kalgoorlie: they would share anything ensuing from the prospect on a 50/50 basis.

The Kambalda nickel deposits were found in January 1966 and the following years saw a boom in exploration throughout the Goldfields that rivalled the discovery of gold in Coolgardie.

WMC became Australia's major nickel producer. Cowcill and Morgan were rewarded for their role in the discovery with a \$25,000 ex-gratia payment each, but neither of them got any mining titles and the payment recognised the fact that they had brought the prospect to WMC's attention. Now it was time to rebuild...

Council Approves New Works For Aquatic Facility

During construction of the Kambalda Aquatic Facility, it became apparent that Council had the opportunity to increase the scope of works to the facility by adding additional items that were originally planned for Stage 2 of the development in the next financial year.

At a Special Council meeting on 30 October 2019, Council were presented with a range of options that would significantly improve the features offered to the community. These were outside of the original tendered scope of works but were being considered for Stage 2 of the development at a later date.

The most significant of the additional works are:

- Pool lighting upgrade to current standards;
- Retractable shade sails to the learn-to-swim pool;
- · Learn-to-swim pool solar heating and blankets;
- Additional refurbishments in canteen and changerooms; and
- Landscaping including wheelchair accessible BBQs.

The learn-to-swim pool, with a beach entry, will now be heated and have a retractable shade structure, which will significantly improve accessibility for young children, seniors and people with disabilities. It will provide a greater opportunity for sports participation and physical rehabilitation to community members, including the 180 people with disabilities residing in the Shire.

The Shire recently developed partnerships through Memorandum of Understandings with St John Medical, Goldfields Individual and Family Support



Association, Addlife Physiotherapy, and Bright Minds Therapy.

The MOUs contribute to a wider holistic community health plan called the St John Country Primary Health Care Model. The model is the first of its kind in regional Western Australia and aims to develop healthy communities and co-ordinated care for Aboriginal Australians and people with long-term disabilities.

Attracting and retaining people to regional WA can be challenging and the MOUs are designed to help the Shire to be more "Inclusive and Accessible" to everyone, irrespective of their ability or disability.

The new items will allow the Shire to extend its swimming programs to provide specialised water aerobics, learn-to-swim classes and interactive aqua sessions for small children, seniors and people with disabilities.

The lighting upgrade to Australian and Swimming WA standards will allow the pool to be used for swimming training at night.

Due to the requirements to meet these standards, if this upgrade was not completed, the pool would not be able to be used for night training.

The original date of practical completion for the facility was 2 February 2020. The new date for practical completion is now 18 March 2020.

This date is subject to no unforeseen delays relating to third party suppliers such as utilities connections, health approvals, delivery of supplies and landscaping.

"By bringing these additions into a single stage, the community will receive a very high-quality pool - likely one of the best aquatic facilities for its population size in Western Australia," said Malcolm Cullen, Shire President. "This will also be the only heated outdoor learn-to-swim pool in the region with these features for children, seniors and people with disabilities.

A completion of the full scope of the facility by 18 March 2020 gives a 10-and-a-half month construction timeframe which is reasonable for a project of this size; particularly for a refurbishment bringing aging infrastructure up to a new standard.

"We know the community are really looking forward to the opening and hope that all community members understand that the inclusive and high-quality facilities will be worth the time it takes for construction."

Construction of the Kambalda Aquatic Facility Project commenced on 10 May 2019.

At each rating, the fire behaviour and potential impact on you will be different. Be sure to monitor this rating system daily to keep informed about the local bushfire danger.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

What should I do with my pets and livestock during an emergency?

Part of your bushfire preparations should include preparing for any pets or animals you have on your property. As an owner of animals you have a duty of care to provide appropriate food, water, shelter and treatment for injury or disease for your animals.

Having a duty of care for an animal means you are legally obliged to care for it by providing for its needs in a reasonable way, so it is important to have a plan in place if a bushfire were to occur.

I can see and smell smoke, but here is no bushfire alert. What do I do?

DFES responds to more than 6,500 bushfires each year and only issues alerts and warnings when there is a known possible threat to life or property.

If there is no alert posted on the www.emergency.wa.gov.au website, recorded on the information line or distributed to the media, it often means there is no threat to your area at this time.

In the event that there is a bushfire that is known to be threatening property or personal safety, DFES will issue community warnings and alerts through a number of channels.

However, bushfires can start suddenly so you need to be ready to act even if you do not get an official warning. You need to stay alert on hot days and look for information, regularly going outside to check for signs of bushfire. Act immediately for your own safety. Do not wait and see – this can be deadly.

How can I find out today's Fire Danger Rating for my area?

Fire Danger Ratings are issued by the Bureau of Meteorology and are publicised by DFES when there is a rating of severe or above.

Check the Fire Danger Ratings page to find out whether your area has a rating at severe or above.


If your area is not listed on that page, you can find out the Fire Danger Rating for your area by going to the Bureau of Meteorology's website and clicking on the relevant section of the map. Alternatively, scroll to the bottom of the Shire of Coolgardie website and view the Fire Danger Rating in the bottom footer.

What are firebreaks? Why are they required?

Firebreaks are 'a strip of land that has been cleared of all trees, bushes, grasses and any other object or thing or flammable vegetation leaving clear, bare mineral earth.'

Firebreaks are also used as a generic term to describe the broader fire prevention work required by land or property owners.

Firebreaks are required in order to provide a safe area for firefighters to work from in a bushfire, to prevent the extension of a bushfire, and to prevent a fire entering or leaving your property.




honey mustard chicken with bacon & avocado

INGREDIENTS:

- 1/3 cup honey
- 3 tablespoons whole grain mustard
- 2 tablespoons smooth and mild Dijon mustard
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1-2 tablespoons apple cider vinegar (or white vinegar), (optional to cut through the sweetness)
- 1 teaspoon minced garlic
- Salt to season
- 4 skinless and boneless chicken thighs or chicken breasts
- 1/4 cup diced bacon, trimmed of rind and fat
- 4 cups Romaine lettuce leaves, washed
- 1 cup sliced grape or cherry tomatoes
- 1 large avocado, pitted and sliced
- 1/4 cup corn kernels
- 1/4 of a red onion, sliced

METHOD:

- 1. Whisk marinade/dressing ingredients together to combine. Pour half the marinade into a shallow dish to marinade the chicken fillets for two hours if time allows. Refrigerate the reserved untouched marinade to use as a dressing.
- 2. Heat a non-stick pan (or grill pan or skillet) over medium heat with about a teaspoon of oil and grill chicken fillets on each side until golden, crispy and cooked through. (Grill in batches to prevent excess water being released.) Once chicken is cooked, set aside and allow to rest.
- 3. Wipe pan over with paper towel; drizzle with another teaspoon of oil and fry the bacon until crispy.
- 4. Slice chicken into strips and prepare salad with leaves, tomatoes, avocado slices, corn, onion strips and chicken.
- 5. Whisk 2 tablespoons of water into the remaining untouched dressing and drizzle over the salad. Sprinkle the bacon over the top and season with a little extra salt and cracked pepper (optional).



There are many types of portable pools, ranging from small plastic or inflatable paddling pools, specifically designed for young children, to larger more solid inflatable pools or flexible sided pools with frames that can accommodate adults

Young children can drown in portable pools in a matter of seconds if left unsupervised.

Any pool that is designed for swimming, wading and paddling that contains water more than 30cm deep, must be enclosed by an effective safety barrier that complies with the laws. Please refer to the summarised checklist overleaf.

Help save young lives in and around water

- Never prop a pool gate open.
- Ensure you always actively supervise children within arm's reach whenever they are in, or around the water regardless of how much water is in the pool.
- Never rely on older children to supervise younger children, no matter how confident you are about their ability.
- For smaller pools ensure they are emptied and stored safely away from young children after use
- Ensure the pool cannot fill with rainwater or water from sprinklers.
- Ensure the barrier is clear of climbable objects.

Rules for PORTABLE POOLS



🔞 Did you know?

By law, swimming and spa pools containing water more than 30cm deep must have effective safety barriers that restrict access by young children.

This includes portable pools.

oes your safety barrier tick all the boxes?

If not, you risk the lives of young children and may face substantial fines or prosecution.

This summarised checklist is not exhaustive and should be read in conjunction with the Rules for Pools and Spas brochure.

Check the pool gate

- Does the pool gate close by itself from any open position?
- Does the gate have a self-latching device?
- Does the gate open away from the pool?
- Is the latch release mechanism at least 1.5 metres above the ground?

Check the pool fence

- is the fence fixed securely in place?
- Is the outside of the fence at least 1.2 metres high?
- Are all vertical uprights in the fence spaced less than 10cm apart?
- Is there at least 90cm between handholds and footholds?
- Is the bottom of the fence 10cm or less from the around?
- Is the surface directly beneath the fence stable and not easily eroded?
- If a boundary fence forms part of the pool safety barrier, is it at least 1.8 metres high?

Check climbable objects

Barbecues, flower-pots, trees, retaining walls, plumbing, cubby houses, toys, outdoor furniture, pool pumps etc. may all help a young child to climb into the pool area.

Is the pool area clear of any items that would assist a child to climb over the fence or reach the latch on the gate that provides access to the pool area?

Check windows

Is the openable portion of a window that forms part of a safety barrier:

- permanently restricted to open no more than 10cm by a device that requires the use of a tool to remove it?
 - or
- covered by bars or a metal screen, fixed in place by a device that requires the use of a tool to remove it?

Please note that key locks are not considered to be a permanent restriction.

Doors

- Doors with direct access to the pool area require local government approval
- Pet doors are not permitted.

We had to ensure that all tasks were completed correctly and then drop anchor just outside Fremantle Harbour successfully.


It was certainly a challenging day but we were all so proud of ourselves for achieving it.

My most important goal was to climb to the top of the main mast, which I am proud to say that I achieved. Overall, I will never forget the people that I met onboard, the skills that I have learnt and the challenges I have faced and overcome. James Balzano was in Kambalda in 1897-98

Attempting to collect historical information about Kambalda is a huge challenge with material scattered, sometimes mislaid, unavailable, omitted and quite often in publications and libraries involving copyright law that restricts use, or in the case of images, there is also a cost involved.

But, by collecting what is available to hand in books, newspapers and written notes, a collection is being establish as a platform for building historical archives for the community, at the Kambalda Arts Centre.

In 1991 and 1992, Ron Manners and George Compton were compiling a book titled "Kanowna's Barrowman" - James Balzano—ISBN 0859051765. Ron had Balzano's diary, so about that time, it appears that our Mrs Billie Ingham was travelling to Kalgoorlie to transcribe the sections in Balzano's notes relative to his Red Hill stay.

This task was very difficult due to James's bad hand writing and time only allowed enough to do what was done. Thank you for your efforts Billie.

The period transcribed was between 10th March 1897 through to 27th May 1897.

According to Billie's notes, James was here through to 13th April 1898, including some time close by on block 48.

Attempts to locate Balzano's diary to complete this exercise have been futile. Ron Manners was contacted and he referred to the Kanowna Barrowman book for the Red Hill notes.

Although the book does have several pages of information regarding Red Hill, there is a footnote stating that the Appendix listing is not including the first hand account of the original Red Hill (Kambalda) gold discovery.

Enquiries have followed with Eastern Goldfields Historical Society indicating that the diary may have deteriorated due to its age, handling and consequently lost. Keeping this in mind, there is always a chance that someone may have recorded the missing pages, unbeknown to us. Wishful thinking.

But, further research has led to the Kambalda progress committee meeting minutes that appear in the Coolgardie Pioneer for that period, so more information will come to hand.

The difficulties experienced in interpreting Balzano's notes associated with Kanowna's Barrowman were overcome because James transcribed some of his own notes later in life for the purpose of compiling more accurate historical records, but that does not appear to be the case for the Red Hill period.

The difficulties with Kambalda history is the short life of the original township, 1897—1907. It could be considered that it did not amount to much as it became a ghost town like others. But, when you look at what followed with the nickel boom, rebirth of Kambalda and the now substantial contribution it has made to the economy, its new history, then maybe more attention should be paid to the pioneering days and do more Here is a extract of Balzano's notes from 23rd February 1897, when he was in Coolgardie. (See original notes below).

Red Hill Rush

Transcribed— "At 5.15pm a horse wagon passed by my tent loaded up with swags, provisions, tools & dry bowers & 16 men going out to Red Hill on Lake Lefroy—it is no use for me to go and try my luck. I have a shabby fortune & frowning heaven and a stern fate to face. I dreamed the other night that I was prepping up gold that means I will never get any gold and condemned to a long life of failures and disappointments and of sorrows—this evening & Feb 24—? 2 drays and 10 men going to Red Hill Rush."

By March 3rd, James decided to try his luck at Red Hill and headed off, arriving on March 10th.

Try to read the writing and understand the difficulties. Yet, we should be grateful for James's efforts. He was a great man and very much loved. Apologies for any errors, but the message is clear.—the barrowman took up the challenge.


